frightened. At that time, a woman appeared, ordered the storm to stop and then
left. The fishermen thought she was A-Ma, the goddess of the sea, so they built
the A-Ma temple to remember her. The people also called the place A-Ma-Gao,
which means the place of A-Ma. In the 16th century, Portuguese controlled the
place. The Portuguese adopted the name A-Ma-Gao, and gradually changed it
into 'Macau'.

Aunt Sorry to keep you waiting, Joseph. Now what do you want to know about Macau?

Magdalena:

Joseph: I've never been to Macau. Where is it?

Aunt Macau is located on the southeast coast of China. It's about 60 km from Hong

Magdalena: Kong. We need to take a ferry to get there.

Joseph: I see. Is Macau as small as Hong Kong?

Aunt It's much smaller! Macau is comprised of the Macau Peninsula and the two

Magdalena: islands of Taipa and Coloane. The total area is about 40 times smaller than Hong Kong and 23 times smaller than Singapore!

Joseph: Wow, it's really small! But it can still stand out to be a well-known city. Are there a lot of people living in Macau?

Aunt Well, there are currently about 500 thousand people living in Macau. Among

Magdalena: them, about 95% are Chinese. The remaining population includes Portuguese and Filipinos.

Joseph: That means less than 5% of the population are Portuguese! Are you one of them, Aunt Magdalena?

Aunt No, I'm Chinese.

Magdalena:

Joseph: But you can speak Portuguese fluently.

Aunt It's because I learnt Portuguese during my primary and secondary education. It's

Magdalena: one of the official languages in Macau, together with Chinese. However, few schools in Macau teach Portuguese since Macau was returned to China in 1999. Some people think English is more important so students nowadays mainly learn Chinese and English.

Joseph: I see. Oh, Aunt Magdalena, it's getting dark and I need to go home to have dinner. Thank you for telling me much about Macau today. You've been very helpful.

Aunt You're welcome, Joseph. Maybe I can take you to Macau for a holiday next year!
